The reflective pieces share the insights gleaned from current issues of language teaching and learning from a veteran teacher, researcher and educator over a span of more than four decades. The book review titled: **Research Methods in Education** asserts that this book is a must read and a valuable companion for both novice and seasoned researchers and educators as it encapsulates the essential and core elements and methods required for engaging and embarking upon research.

This issue knits together a rich tapestry of perspectives that relate to the emotional, cultural, technological and practical aspects of language teaching. The varied and similar themes of the articles are tied in a coherent manner, while engaging the readers with current issues in ELT!
