While the word colonialism is sometimes considered to encompass non-state forms of influence and domination, in general use, it is more typically understood as an extension of state power (Young, R., 2001).

It involves the dominant power exerting control over the dependent area or people in different forms. One of them may be mental colonialism. Mental colonialism is a form of internalized oppression that conditions colonized people to believe that their ethnic or cultural identity is inferior to Western culture or whiteness. It can lead to low self-esteem, lower life satisfaction, and other widespread mental health issues in populations that have experienced colonization (Asian Mental Health Project., 2020: Everyday Feminism., 2017).

Mental Colonialism

Mental colonialism is a pervasive issue in modern society that can manifest in various ways. It can lead to a negative self-image, low self-esteem, and other widespread mental health issues in populations that have experienced colonization. Let's discuss few examples as follow.

Neocolonialism: Neocolonialism is a form of colonialism that takes on the form of cultural imperialism, capitalism, and globalization. It can lead to the internalized attitude of ethnic or cultural inferiority felt by people as a result of colonization.

Loss of culture or language: The effects of colonialism can lead to the loss of culture or language in colonized countries. This can lead to a sense of cultural inferiority and a lack of pride in one's own cultural heritage (Decena, A. M. ,2014).
