Discussion

Diction and Tone

The poet uses simple yet profound diction to convey complex ideas about existence and spirituality. Words like "truth," "guide," and "selflessness" reflect the moral and philosophical overtones of the poem. The tone is reflective and didactic in nature to make one ponder over the dependence upon a superpower or invisible force that shapes one's life. By pitting the selfishness of individuals against the selflessness of the guiding force, Adhikari is criticising human tendencies to lie and be selfish. The line "If you are worn-out, he may leave you" is quite a reminder of how temporary human life is and how conditional this guiding relationship is. However, this theme of existential dependency is more strikingly appealing because, without this unseen presence, as the poet says, individuals lose their identity and purpose.
